

OUR FINANCIAL STATUS AT GRACE IN THE DESERT

Times have been tough for everyone this last year, and Grace in the Desert is no exception – here's a snapshot of our financial standing as of January 1, 2021

We are not generally comfortable talking about money because our belief is that the primary mission of the Church is just that – mission. But, the fact remains that we still have expenses that need to be paid each month, quarter, or year, depending on the cycle for billing for each expense. Pastor Ceri has not taken a paycheck from Grace in the Desert since November 2020. Prior to that, her monthly income from GTD was \$1,050 per month. Broken down, that includes \$700 for salary, \$300 for housing allowance, and \$50 for website and Newsletter creation. She is currently seeking employment that will allow her to continue making GTD a priority while still being able to pay her bills and be financially responsible.

Last year, our expenses, outside of Pastor

Ceri's salary, were \$3173.78. Our only expenditure for rent was for the month of January. Otherwise, our expenses were for music and video licenses, insurance, website/domain name, and some miscellaneous. While she has not calculated for 2020, in 2019, Pastor Ceri also spent a little over \$3800 of her own money on church business. Beginning January 1, our balance in checking is \$987.46 and savings is \$289.68.

The bottom line is that even though we are worshiping on-line, we still have expenses that need to be paid and the work that needs to be done for each service is the same. It's just a different way of delivering the Word. Please consider making a gift to GTD so that we can continue to do the work we are doing to reach the World for Jesus.

Of Lent and Love

While Lent and Love may not seem, at first glance, to go together, it could be argued that the greatest Act of Love in human history happened on that first Good Friday as Jesus died on the Cross for the sins of humankind

February is the month in our calendar when we talk a lot about the "L" word – Love. We acknowledge that God is Love. We strive to live into the agape love that God shows us as He loves us unconditionally in spite of our sins, faults, failures, and shortcomings. It is how we are called to love each other. Even, Jesus said, our enemies as He tells us to love our enemies and pray for those who persecute us.

As hard as this is, we just need to remember the words of Jesus from the Cross – "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do." That is agape love in action. Jesus didn't just pour out His blood because of Love for those who we believe are worthy – He poured out His blood for the entire world. Take a good look at John 3:16 – For God so loved the *world* – that means everybody.

And I would argue that's where the connection between Lent and Love is really apparent. God so loved the world with a Love that we can't imagine and don't deserve – to the point that He came to earth as a human and died an awful death so that we could gain salvation and not have to suffer the consequences of our sin.

How many of us love like that? How many of us would even think to sacrifice our life for the life of someone else – even someone we totally love? Valentine's Day is a day to show those we love how much we love them - but what if we were more like God and showed them every day of the year? What if every day was like Valentine's Day? What if we were more like God and how He loves to everyone in our lives and our community? In the words of Louis Armstrong, "What a wonderful world it would be."

One of the most beautiful Truths in Scripture is that "God is Love." He is the role model for Love ... He loved us enough to come down to Earth and die for us so that we could be reconciled to Him. He wants us to love others like He loves us ... with His Spirit living inside us, that is possible, but, unlike God, we have to work at it to make it happen.

Pastor Ceri's Corner

What are you giving up for Lent – or are you adding something as a sacrifice?.

Every year around this time, we hear the same question around Christendom – "What are you giving up for Lent?" I always used to give up something I really liked – chocolate or some other food or beverage – but a few years ago, I had a thought. It seems that no matter what we give up, we are counting down until the time when we can have that thing again. So ... how far does our sacrifice really go? If we don't plan on giving something up permanently, then how serious are we about making an actual sacrifice? It struck me that adding something is just as much of a sacrifice as giving something up. And, that addition could well become a habit. – what a concept, huh?

So, I have begun the practice of adding something during Lent – a sacrifice of time. I add an additional devotion to the ones that I already do each year. This year, I will be adding a devotional entitled "By His Wounds We are Healed." I also have a couple more – hopefully, I'll do at least one of them. It is my prayer as I do this each year that this additional devotion will become a habit and that I will continue to keep doing an "extra" devotion each day. I am human and a sinner and I don't always accomplish this but, like many, I will try and hope that, this year, I will succeed in my grand plan.

Maybe we could add something to our daily routine that would be pleasing to God – maybe not daily, but weekly messages to an assisted living facility, long term care facility, or hospital. Perhaps, after COVID is over, this could turn into a ministry of sorts - visiting the sick and hurting is always pleasing to God. Maybe making a plan to spend more quality time with family or friends – or both. That doesn't have to be expensive and it doesn't even have to be in person – maybe scheduled Zoom visits or game nights – or date nights with our spouse ... all ideas that can become habits by adding them during Lent and continuing to practice them after that season has passed. Maybe we could combine our daily prayer with a walk around the block or around the community. It's good for the soul and the body – and you never know who you will meet on the way – maybe someone you could invite to church (whether in person or virtual).

Back to the giving something up for Lent, perhaps that, too, can be an opportunity to give up something that really is not good for us and to have that become a habit moving forward. Maybe there's a food (or a food group) that is keeping us from being as healthy as we could be. Or perhaps there's a beverage (or two or three) that, if absent from our lives, would help us to be healthier. Our bodies are God's temple, so we do need to take care of them.

So ... you get the idea ... sacrifice is not a one-size-fits-all endeavor and it doesn't always mean giving up, sometimes it can mean adding to. I think the whole concept is to find ways during Lent that we can honor God and draw closer to Him as we remember His Sacrifice for us on the Cross. No matter how we do that, God will be pleased.

As I write this, more and more churches are closing their doors because of lack of money. That's the bottom line. It's a fact of life in this pandemic that some people don't have the money to give to church – it becomes a low priority. And I also think that for some, the perception is that if a church is strictly on-line, expenses must be less, too. But that is not the case. We still have to have liability insurance, we still need to keep our music and video licenses up. While I am not currently drawing a salary, I am putting in the same amount of work each week and month to make sure that we have a service, the website is updated, and the Newsletter goes out.

In light of our financial situation right now, it appears that our only option when are able to go back to live worship is to continue to worship from our home in Buckeye. That accomplishes a couple of things – our insurance is lower and we don't have to pay rent.

As I said before, the primary goal of the Church as a whole and this congregation is mission – getting the word out about Jesus to those who do not yet know Him. The bottom line, though, is that I cannot do that alone – that is another hard truth. I am one person and, while doing Alpha online is much easier for less people to accomplish on-line, more hands would make much lighter work.

So here's the bottom line – we are struggling financially, but God is still working in and through us – and He will do powerful things with our ministry, if we will let Him. I don't believe He wants us to close the doors, but we are definitely in a period of growth and learning about what we are actually made of.

It's challenging – I know that, believe me. But it's not impossible – God is in the midst of us working in and with and through us to build His Kingdom. He has giving us all the tools we need to be active participants in a grand experience of knowing and serving Him. I believe we are up to the challenge and that brings me Hope – the Hope that only comes from the Spirit moving in and through us. We are gaining viewers on Facebook Live. We have been boosting the

service each week and have gained page likes and service likes each week. That is a great start – and Alpha can build on that foundation. There is reason to Hope ...

Our good friend Deb Goguen's verse when she was Rectora sums it all up for me – it is my prayer for all of us and my prayer for Grace in the Desert.

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope. Romans 15:13
